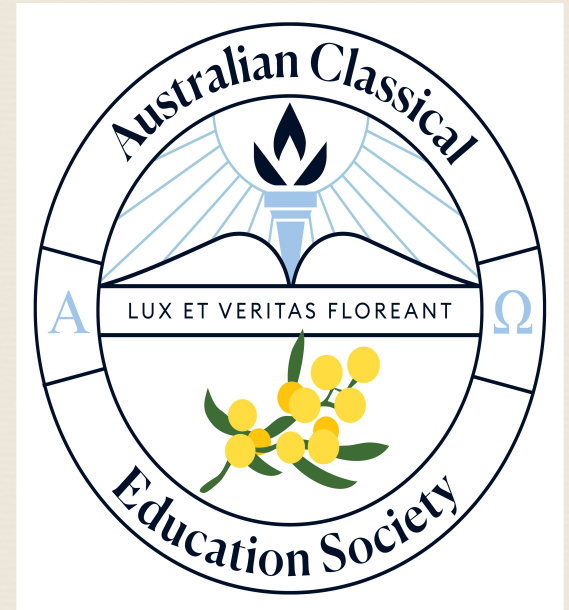

LIBERAL ARTS:

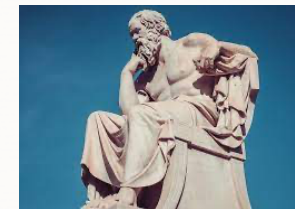
